I am confused about the word: اللَّهُمَّ

How does it mean: يَا اللهُ ?

Dear Br Alamgir

The word $\stackrel{2}{\text{locally}}$ has a special form for $nid\bar{a}$, and that is adding the particle $\stackrel{2}{\text{mma}}$ at the end of the word Allāh so it becomes:

This particle is a particle of $nid\bar{a}$ like \hat{u} .

Sometimes in poetry يا can be prefixed to :

Ibnu Mālik, رَحِمَهُ الله says in the Alfiyyah:

And mostly it is Allāhumma with compensation.

And it is rare to say yā Allāhumma in poetry.

The meaning is:

When $\dot{\omega}$ was omitted, the word was compensated for the loss of this particle with the addition of $\ddot{\omega}$.

In poetry one may say يَا اللَّهُمَّ , i.e. with both the particles (يَا اللَّهُمَّ and), but this is rare.

Hope this answers your question.
