

## Studying Pre-Islāmic Poetry



## Question

Our dear Shaykh,

- 1. Where are pre-Islamic poems preserved? Is there a book which compiled all of these poems?
- 2. Has every word that appears in the Qur'ān (except for Arabized foreign names) appeared before in Jāhiliyyah poetry and prose?

I ask this because I want to know if studying Jāhiliyyah poetry intensively will help me understand every single word in the Qur³ān in depth.

## Faḍīlat al-Shaykh Dr. V. Abdur Rahim (حفظه الله) replies:



Dear Br Aman Syed وعليكم السلام

1. The pre-Islāmic poetry has been preserved in many collections such as the anthologies (کُواوِینُ dawāwīn) of individual poets. Other collections are:

المعلقات

المفضليات

الأصمعيات

جمهرة أشعار العرب

ديوان الحماسة

and others.

2. There is no Jāhiliyy prose.

I do not think that all Qur'anic words are found in the Jahiliyy poetry.

You may study the Jāhiliyy poerty for its own merit, but not to understand the Qur³ān. It is true that the Jāhiliyy poetry has words and syntactical structures which are peculiar to the Glorious Qur³ān, and ibn ʿAbbās (وضي الله عنهما) used to quote the pre-Islāmic poetry to prove lexical and grammatical points to the critics of the Qur³ān.

One may learn these points. But it is not correct to study the corpus of Jāhiliyy poetry to understand the Glorious Qur³ān.
